From the Cabin Car


Greetings Everyone!



While on a family trip to Tampa, FL this past March, I had the opportunity to visit the Robert W. Willaford Railroad Museum located in Plant City, FL at the Union Station Depot, a national register listed historical property. As with many rail-

road museums, this too had numerous outdoor and indoor static displays of rolling stock, signal devices, MOW equipment, railroadiana, and an operating indoor HO scale layout.

What I found unique about this particular museum was the active rail lines adjacent to the depot where railfanning platforms are present for all to enjoy prototype trains to your heart's content. The adjacent active lines have a pair of crossing diamonds owned by CSX (ex-Seaboad System, ex-Atlantic Coast Line, and CSX Plant City Subdivision) which enhance the railfanning experience. Luckily, we timed our visit when the Amtrak Silver Star (Washington, DC/Miami, FL) was passing through...and of course I waited to capture a video of it!

A \$5.00 Donation per person is asked for.


Also, members are asked to bring folding lawn chairs

Please bring something to donate to our Model Railroad and Railroad Memorabilia Prize table.








April 12, 2025 - Division Mtg. at HDC / Lockport Train Show

Presentation slide by Mr. Rich Wurst




Niagara Orleans Model Railroad Engineers at Lockport Train Show

To Albany and Back

Our Superintendent found out that I was taking a train to Albany. He asked me if I would do him a favor. I said yes. What do you need me to do? He said to take a notepad with me and write about my trip, write it up, and get it over to Gerry, our newsletter editor, immediately. So, here I go.

Amtrak? Really? Yes really. I have taken this trip twice now and would highly recommend it. My son and daughter-in-law just had their first child, Madeleine Lotti



MacVie (Lotti is a derivative of Charlotte), and Grandma needed to get there right away; after all, a newborn was waiting to be held. They live near Saratoga Springs, so a train that stopped in Albany was what we needed.





So, my Wife, Louise, and I got to the Amtrak station

in Depew early in the morning for a 7:41 AM departure of Amtrak's

Empire Service. About a dozen people were waiting for the train. Amtrak has three different trains that service Buffalo: The Lake Shores Limited (Chicago to New York City and return), the Maple Leaf



(Toronto to New York City and return), and the Empire Service Niagara Falls, NY to New York City and return) The Empire Express starts in

Niagara Falls, NY, so we were the first stop; there were stops in Rochester, Syracuse, Rome, Utica, Amsterdam, Schenectady, Albany-Rensselaer, and then on the rest of the way to NYC.



We rode in Business Class; the seats are like recliners and have great leg room. The car also includes a café and a dining room. For business-class passengers, all beverages are included.



There is a bathroom just beyond the dining area. Everything you need is in one car, so you don't have to walk to the train to get something to eat or to the bathroom. Yes, business class does cost more, but because of the great seats and convenience, we feel it's worth it. After all, we will be on this train for five-plus hours, depending on the delays. I could drive it in about four hours without delay; however, weather, traffic, and staying alert for hours make you fatigued by the trip's end. So, relaxing in a recliner sounded pretty good to me.


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To Albany and Back (continued)

I read a train book, took a nap, visited with my wife, had lunch, visited the men's room, and watched the countryside go by while traveling to Albany.

While not looking like I thought he would, our conductor was friendly and explained to me

that Amtrak, for whatever reason, had taken away his ticket punch. Each conductor had a unique emblem on the punch. Amtrak never told the conductors why they were discontinuing the punches. Too bad. I thought that was cool, but times have changed. The conductor still called out







our trip. While watching the countryside go by, you see some interesting things you might not see if you were concentrating on the road ahead. Just outside of the Rochester (Browncroft), NY area, I was

looking out at the dirty window at the end of our car to check out

the signals, you can't do that in a car.

Later at Utica, I found the Southern Terminus of the Adirondack Railroad, which had lots of interesting equipment. I also saw some of the countryside. Following this route is very interesting, and I wonder how many other people over the years could view what I





was looking at. It's a very cool thought.

We could see the backs of homes and businesses as we



approached Schenectady. This gave a whole different view of neighborhoods



and their streets. You realize the tracks run on the side of town with the less expensive property. This is a modeler's notebook of structures and scenes to model.



As we finished our trip, the Albany skyline appeared, and we

picked up our rented car and were on our way to

meet our newest granddaughter. Since I started this article, we have taken another trip to Albany.



To Albany and Back (continued)

On this trip, I captured trackside photos for modeling reference on our journey to Albany. We had a wonderful visit with our granddaughter; she likes grandpa. But the real fun was starting as we waited to start back to Buffalo. Engine 702 arrived from New York City as we waited for our return trip.



Engine 702 took on fuel. And we were ready to go. We got the signals we needed and away we went. We again read, checked the scenery, listened to music, watched TV, and surfed the internet. As we



passed Syracuse, we needed to stop for some freight traffic, and as we did, the lights went off for a few minutes. As we later discovered, the Engine had trouble keeping the computers on. To reboot them, you need to turn off the whole engine and reboot the



computers. Now, that's what I call a hard reboot. Finally, 702 could go no further, just as we were leaving Rochester. The crew pushed us back to the platform, and we waited for the next train to Buffalo, which was 55 minutes behind us. As our new train arrived, I watched as they hooked up the couplers so we could drag our train to Niagara Falls behind our new train. The trip should have taken 5 hours, but it took us 10 hours to return. I was so pleased that Amtrak didn't charge us for

the extra fun. I only paid for 5 hours; here, they gave us 10 hours for the same price. What a deal.

Some of you may think taking the train is a little too unreliable. But I can't tell you how often I sat on a tarmac waiting for my plane to take off or in highway construction traffic jams, so for me, I can't wait for my next train trip.

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Ops Ops Ops

Over the past ten to fifteen years, model railroad operations has become an active part of the hobby. Model railroad operation involves running trains and performing tasks like picking up and delivering freight cars, classifying cars, and building trains. Operations is doing role play - engineer, brakeman, hostler, dispatcher, etc., to bring life to any size of layout in a somewhat prototypical manner. Think of the model railroad as a theater where the trains are the actors. If you have never tried operations you are missing out on an extremely interesting and fun part of the hobby.

If you participate in an operations session, you will have the opportunity to run a train on your hosts layout. When you run a train, there are three things that you need to consider. First you need to know what type of train it is, where it is going, and where does it stop along the way. You learn this information from the train orders. This can be written on an order sheet or simply your host saying "take this train to North Yard and stop along the way at Hamberg to pick up some cars".

Once you have a train, you need to know a little about the traffic control system in use. The types of traffic control system include:

- 1. Random Run anything, anytime.
- 2. Free Form Sequential –Trains run in a specific order. The layout owner indicates what trains run next.
- 3. Track Warrants Generally verbal Track Warrants are used, i.e. a dispatcher tell an individual train when and how far they can go.
- 4. Time Table & Train Order (TT&TO) Tains are run in Real Time as needed. This technique is somewhat complicated and will not be used in any of the op sessions.

Ops Ops Ops (continued)

If every train just did what they wanted, you will have situations as illustrated below. Generally, we like to stay away from this.

Similarly, TT&TO would require you to be familiar with the rule book, time table, clock and be in contact with the dispatcher. Sounds complicated, well it is and none of the layouts in this division use this technique of traffic control. What you will find is a dispatcher (generally the layout host) will verbally tell you when and how far you can go.



Finally, when you get to one of the places where your train stops, you will need a method to determine what car you pick up and what cars you must set out. This is called car forwarding and the three most common methods used are: tacks on cars; switch lists and car card and weigh bills. Each system has its advantages and disadvantages and all of them are used on the different layouts in our division. Your host will indicate which system they use and give you a small tutorial on how it works.

You would have the opportunity to sign up for the layout of your choice or attend all four session. At the end of the two days, you will experience several different types of operations and freight forwarding techniques. I also guarantee that by the end you will be hooked on operation.

Specifics as to time and place will be discussed during our upcoming divisional meetings. Or if you wish you can email the author (<u>gar2rey@gmail.com</u>) (be sure to type op session in the subject entry) and I will keep you informed via email. We are planning to run these op sessions in early fall so keep in touch.
